POLICE WARN OF RECENT INTERNET SCAM

The police department has taken several reports from residents who have been the victims of an online scam. The premise of this scam is the victim receives an email purporting to be from the victim's financial institution. The email asks the victim to participate in a brief online survey. Upon completing the survey, the victim is asked to enter an account number so as to be compensated for participating. Usually, within a matter of hours, the victims dis-

cover that their accounts have been compromised. Financial institutions NEVER contact members and request account or personal information through emails or over the telephone. Should you receive an email or telephone call reporting to be from your financial institution, do not respond to the solicitation and contact your financial institution.

The city will soon start a pilot project of two hour parking on Willamette Street. This project comes

as a result of concerns raised by local business owners who are experiencing vehicles who park in front of their businesses and remain for most of the day. This pilot project will encompass the East side of Willamette Street from McKenzie Street to Mill Street. The two hour parking will be enforced Monday through Friday from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Weekends and holidays will not be included in the enforcement.

NOXIOUS VEGETATION INFORMATION

Ordinance A-108 requires that noxious vegetation be removed from property and not allowed to grow to a height of more than ten inches between June 1st and September 30 of any year. Noxious vegetation can be a health, fire or traffic hazard. Please read and observe the listed Section of Ordinance A-108 by removing noxious vegetation from your property. Contact City Hall (682-7850) or Coburg Public Works (682-7857) if you have questions.

ORDINANCE NO. A-108

Section 18. Noxious Vegetation.

The term "noxious vegetation" does not include vegetation that constitutes an agricultural crop, unless that vegetation is a health hazard or a fire or traffic hazard within the meaning of Subsection (2) of this section.

The term "noxious vegetation" does include, at any time between June 1 and September 30 of any year:

Weeds more than 10 inches high.

Grass more than 10 inches high and not within the exception stated in Subsection (1) of this section.

Poison oak.

Poison ivy.

Blackberry bushes that extend into a public thoroughfare or across a property line.

Vegetation that is:

A health hazard.

A fire hazard because it is near other combustibles, or

A traffic hazard because it impairs the view of a public thoroughfare or otherwise makes use of the thoroughfare hazardous.

ORDINANCE NO. A-108b

"(3) Between June 1 and September 30 of any year, no owner or person in charge of property shall allow noxious vegetation to be on the property, or extend on to or be on the public right of way of a public thoroughfare, street, alley, sidewalk or other public way abutting on the property. It shall be the duty of an owner or person in charge of property to cut down or to destroy grass, shrubbery, brush, bushes, weeds or other noxious vegetation as often as needed to prevent them from becoming unsightly, from becoming a fire hazard, or in the case of weeds or other noxious vegetation, from maturing or from going to seed."

CASCADE SIERRA SOLUTIONS RECEIVES GRANT TO SAVE FUEL AND THE ENVIRONMENT

Coburg non-profit Cascade Sierra Solutions has received a grant of \$50,000 from the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde's Spirit Mountain Community Fund. The funds will go towards Cascade Sierra Solutions' mission of helping diesel truckers save fuel and the environment by applying efficient upgrades to their trucks.

Using the EPA's certified SmartWay technologies, big rigs can save up to 25% of their emissions by using improvements to reduce idling, cut drag, lower rolling resistance and decrease maintenance. Cascade Sierra Solutions brings this technology to truckers by providing accurate advice, assistance with equipment selection and affordable financing to small and large trucking operations.

According to Cascade Sierra Solutions' director of fundraising Sándor Lau, "This grant comes just at the right time when so many small trucking businesses are struggling because of fuel prices over \$4/gallon." Lau estimates that over their lifetimes, the trucks Cascade Sierra Solutions will assist with this money will save 425,000 gallons or more than half an Olympic swimming pool of fuel in the next seven years.

"As a Tribal foundation, we have a long-term passion for the air and the land that we all live in and breathe. As we see air quality diminish and water quality suffer from various pollutants, it's exciting to see an innovative program like this one begin to offer new approaches to pollution abatement," says Director Shelley Hanson. Each year the Tribe, through Spirit Mountain Community Fund, invests nearly \$5 million in non-profit agencies that better the lives of Oregonians.

Saving fuel reduces emissions of diesel particulate matter, oxides of nitrogen and other toxic pollutants which cost Oregon \$2 billion in health care and environmental costs each year.

These fuel savings also reduce emissions of greenhouse gases and Oregon's and the United States' dependence on petroleum.
