

Mayor's Corner Welcome New Councilors

Ray Smith, Mayor

The new year has brought two new City Councilors on board. As mentioned in the last newsletter, Councilor Mark Alexander was elected with write-in votes. Councilor Steve Stearns was re-elected for a second term. Unfortunately, he tendered his resignation in January for personal reasons.

Steve Stearns often travelled from distant work sites to attend Council meetings. He was an ardent spokesperson for trying to lower our utility bills and he brought common sense business experience to the Council. Taking on the role of City Councilor is a daunting commitment of time and energy. I want to publicly thank former Councilor Stearns for his personal commitment to the council and the citizens of Coburg.

Now, I would like to welcome Councilor John Lehman after being appointed by Council vote on February 12th. John Lehman retired from an extensive career in education and has lived in Coburg for about 20 years.

The Council had 3 applicants for

the vacancy; former Councilor Jerry Behney, former Councilor John Fox, and of course, John Lehman. Jerry Behney withdrew his application prior to the interviews.

I do not recall ever having 3 applicants for a vacant council seat. It's always difficult to pick one when you have such qualified candidates.

Thanks to all three candidates for your commitment to Coburg.

I continue to hear concerns from citizens about the growth in Coburg. I want to assure you that concern is well represented by our elected and appointed officials. Because Oregon state statutes force us to plan for growth, we recognize we can't stop growth, but we can control it. Planning Commis-




travelers who finally feel at home here and want to make it the best possible place to grow up for their little angel.

Outdoor activities are right around the corner. I'm looking forward to Spring.


