Oregon Scenic Bikeways Celebrates 10 Years

Did you know that 2019 marked 10 years of Oregon's Scenic Bikeways initiative? The Willamette Valley Bikeway, the inaugural route, begins in Champoeg State Park and follows its namesake river, eventually



passing right down Willamette Street to end in Armitage Park. The Bikeways program now spans 17 breathtaking rides throughout Oregon in a partnership between

the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department, Oregon Department of Transportation, Travel Oregon and Cycle Oregon. It is the first and only program of its kind in the United States. Bicycle tourism, or dollars resulting from involvement in "bicycle-related activities," is a \$400 million industry in Oregon. Besides the investment back into local business along each route, the designated Willamette Valley Scenic Bikeway is a wonderful way to enjoy the history, agricultural bounty and idyllic scenery of the region many of us call home. People all over the country —and world—travel to Oregon to ride this route, the first of its kind, and right in our backyard.

If you're not up for committing to the entire 134 miles of this route, you might want to explore a small section over the course of a day. More information, including maps and cue sheets, can be found at TravelOregon.com/scenicbikeways.
