

# Mayor's Corner Caution for our Community

As summer comes to an end, we are continuing to cope with the COVID-19 pandemic. As most of you know, community leaders met to discuss how the community would deal with upcoming community events as the number of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations soared in Lane County. The discussion group included:

After much discussion, it was decided that the City and Fire District could not support events that would draw hundreds and possibly thousands of people to Coburg.

The highest concern was the

increased potential of exposing our employees and volunteers that provide critical services to Coburg and the surrounding community.

Exposures to our Police or Fire responders could cause quarantines to the responders.

## This could possibly lead to loss of Police and Fire services.

Even with vaccination, people can still get and carry the virus. Thus, if first responders test positive they must be quarantined for several days before being able to respond again.

Coburg has only four paid police officers, three paid fire staff, and volunteers to assist both services. Community leaders had great concern for providing service if there was an exposure and transmission of the virus. Just a few people being exposed could cripple our ability to provide police, fire and emergency medical

### 2021 Coburg Scarecrow Festival Contest

The Scarecrow Festival in Coburg started with humble beginnings just three years ago. Now it's time for

everyone in Coburg to join the fun. It's a great opportunity for the Coburg Community when all of our other festivals and celebrations have been canceled or modified.

PURPOSE: To celebrate autumn with Coburg community-spirit and an invitation for our region to come and experience the best of Coburg and harvest.

We will hold a contest for scarecrow creation. We have established five categories for awards:

- 1. Historic
- Neighborhood (2+ complementary exhibits, judging will consider content and number of displays/ participating neighbors)
- Mechanical/Technology/ Animation/ Best use of materials
- 4. Children (contributions from ages 12 and under)
- 5. Funniest

Prizes will be awarded to the winner of each category. There will be a separate award for the best business entry.

ENTRY FEE: FREE! There is no fee to enter.

DURATION: Scarecrow entries are encouraged to be displayed beginning Labor Day weekend through at least Halloween. For consideration in any contest portion of the festival, your entry must be on display by Wednesday, September 22, at 3:00 pm.

ELIGIBILITY: Scarecrow construction must contain hay, straw, or cornstalks. This event (and contest) is open to all Coburg families, businesses, non-profit groups, including schools, service and community groups, and youth organizations. (Businesses are encouraged to display an entry and one business will be awarded for best scarecrow.)

THEMES: Scarecrows may be traditional, whimsical, humorous, mischievous, fantasy, celebrity, or loveable. All entries are encouraged to include multiple scarecrows (or whimsical characters), as well as props and décor to reflect the theme of the display.

For participation in contest and judging: Violent themes will not be allowed, nor will direct advertising, political, or religious statements. Entrants are reminded that this is a community family event. No items such as tiki torches or flammable objects are allowed, or entries will be disqualified

from event awards. Battery operated lights, mechanical/robotic creativity are welcome.

CONSTRUCTION: Scarecrows must be in good taste and constructed to withstand Willamette Valley weather. Scarecrows must be durable and able to stand up to sun, wind, and rain as they will be displayed from early September through the end of October.

IDENTIFYING SIGNS: As part of your display, be sure to make a sign with the name of your entry or your school, group, business, or service club name. Your sign should be no larger than 11 x 17 inches. No advertising, political, or religious statements will be allowed.

JUDGING/AWARDS: All entries will be evaluated and voted on by an impaneled group from the Coburg Chamber of Commerce.

### Coburg United Methodist Church Closing this Fall

After 118 years of ministry, Coburg United Methodist Church will be closing this fall. We invite community residents to join us for our final worship service Nov. 7 at 10 a.m. It will be a celebration of what we have done as a faith community:

Shared the Good News of God's love in more than 6,000 Sunday worship services.

Hosted annual holiday bazaars, Christmas-in-Coburg singalongs and Easter egg hunts.

Marked life milestones with baptisms, confirmations, weddings and funerals.

Served our neighbors by supporting the Coburg Food Pantry, building Habitat houses and funding and assembling disaster emergency kits for the United Methodist Commission on Relief.

So why are we closing? Like many churches, we have struggled to attract young people and our congregation is aging. We grew so small that we could only support a 1/4-time pastor. When our most recent pastor was reassigned to his home state this summer, we learned there were no 1/4-time Methodist clergy available to replace him.

We voted to close in hopes our building will be repurposed in a new form that will attract new generations to experience God's love. ### **Drought Update from Public Works**



Dear Residents,

At this time, the City is not restricting water usage or asking you to go to odd or even watering days.

We do want to take a moment to ask you to help with the drought that the entire State of Oregon is facing, and ask that you take a look at the tips below, which can help you conserve water. This will not only help with the issue of the drought but could also help lower your water bill. If you have any question or concerns, please reach out to us.

Always turn taps off tightly so they do not drip.

Promptly repair any leaks in and around your taps. (One leak can waste several thousand gallons of water per year.)

Use an aerator and/or a water flow-reducer attachment on your tap to reduce your water usage.

When hand-washing dishes, never run water continuously. Wash dishes in a partially filled sink and then rinse them using the spray attachment on your tap.

If you have an electric dishwasher, use it only to wash full loads, and use the shortest cycle possible.

Many dishwashers have a conserve/water-miser cycle.

When brushing your teeth, turn the water off while you are actually brushing. Use short bursts of water for cleaning your brush. (This saves about 80% of the water normally used.)

When washing or shaving, partially fill the sink and use that water rather than running the tap continuously. (This saves about 60% of the water normally used.)

Use short bursts of water to clean razors.

Use either low flow shower heads or adjustable flow-reducer devices on your shower heads. (They reduce flow by at least 25%.)

Reduce water usage by 40% to 50%

by installing low flush toilets.

Wash only full loads in your washing machine.

Use the shortest cycle possible for washing clothes, and use the "suds-saver" feature if your machine has one.

Use only cleaning products that will not harm the environment when they are washed away after use. Look for "environmentally friendly" products when shopping.

Lawns only take 1 inch of water per week to grow. Less is needed during spring, fall, or cool weather.

Water during the cool part of the day, in the morning or evening. Do not water on windy days.

Do not over-water in anticipation of a shortage. Soil cannot store extra water.

Use shut-off timers or on-off timers, if possible. Do not turn on sprinklers and leave for the day.

### **Evacuation and the Coburg Area**

In some emergency situations it



may be necessary to evacuate portions of the City, or the entire City. This type of emergency

situation might be caused by flooding, volcanic eruptions, truck hazmat spills, large wildfires, etc.

Finding a safe route out of town is limited by our geography and road availability. North and South evacuations are likely to be easiest, our east routes are blocked by the Coburg Hills, and to our west by rivers.

If we had to leave town quickly, where would you go? To the north? To the south? Thinking about this ahead of time makes it easier if it happens.

#### Notification

Notification of the public will be coordinated with Lane County, as they control the public alert system used to notify people through cell phones and cable television. Large signs will also be used to inform the residents. Signs would be placed by these locations:

- North side of IOOF Hall on N.
   Willamette Street
- The Public Information
   Kiosk at Pavilion Park on N.
   Willamette Street
- Other city parks as needed

Other methods may be employed

as needed to notify people of the emergency.

Note: Coburg does not have any numbered "zones" like Eugene-Springfield, we can notify people by street address and by sections of the city.

Sign up to get notified on emergencies by Lane County on their website (Home - Lane County) look for the section on Emergency Preparedness. They will automatically notify you by cell phone/text about emergencies in our area.

Also - Check the "Settings" on your cell phone, and make sure you have enabled your cell to receive emergency notifications.

### **Packing**

Only essential possessions should be taken on emergency evacuations. Read the Lane County website on packing suggestions, in the section on Emergency Preparedness – Evacuation Guide and Information.

#### **Evacuation levels**

It is important to know and understand the three (3) levels of evacuation notices that are used to help the public be ready for these emergencies. Level 1 is caution and Level 3 is get out. Here are descriptions with more detail:

**LEVEL 1 - BE READY:** You should be aware of the danger that exists in the area, monitor emergency services websites (Lane County)

and local media for information. This is the time for preparation and the precautionary movement of people with special needs, mobile property and (under certain circumstances) pets and livestock.

LEVEL 2 - BE SET: You must be prepared to leave at a moment's notice. This level indicates there is a significant danger to your area. You should either voluntarily relocate outside of the affected area or, if choosing to remain, be ready to evacuate at a moment's notice.

Danger to your area is current or imminent and you should evacuate immediately. If you choose to ignore this advisement, you must understand that emergency services may not be able to assist you further. DO NOT delay leaving to gather any belongings or make efforts to protect your home. This will be the last notice you receive. Entry into evacuated areas may be denied until conditions are safe.

Recent evacuations revealed that most people relocate themselves when instructed, and they usually stay with friends or family. A small proportion of people will have no transportation or difficulty finding accommodations for themselves. The city and county will make every effort to help anyone in need during an evacuation.

Response to water and sewer emergencies and daily operation of these critical services could also be hampered if Public Works staff were to be exposed. (Public Works is integral to festivals, providing traffic barricades, cleaning and garbage collection, and securing utilities.)

Other concerns included the potential risk to our residents and employees of our local businesses. The loss of revenue by the Chamber of Commerce will be affected, but was not part of the discussion. (The Antique Fair is the main source of revenue for the Chamber. This revenue helps pay for the Thursday Concerts in the Park, and other community projects and events.)

There was an overwhelming sense of frustration and exasperation that our only reasonable and safe option was to cancel our community events. Many members of this discussion presented options that were given ample discussion and came to the same conclusion. This was a tough decision for all of us, and there was a palpable sense of loss and frustration in the meeting.

I have seen and heard many responses from community members regarding the decision to cancel our festivals. They range from very supportive and thankful, to obvious frustration and anger. As a community leader, I accept all of the statements with a true sense of understanding.

As much as anybody else, I wanted some normalcy. I am tired of the pandemic, the drought, the fires, the

smoke, and climate change. I want to forget about masks and social distancing. I want to enjoy our festival season with my family, friends and neighbors.



We all need this, we are social creatures.

The difficulty of wanting to be social while being concerned for the safety of others during this pandemic is such a paradox for social creatures. As we carry the burden of keeping each other safe, we can still celebrate in the small ways. We can still safely visit with our neighbors as we take our walks, we can appreciate having a safe, comfortable community that respects each other in spite of our differences. Coburg is an amazing community and we will continue to meet our challenges together.

With the tough decision made, I want to publicly thank all of those that participated in the meeting, shared frank concerns, and discussed options openly and candidly. The leaders made the right decision, a tough decision, but the right decision.

Please continue to be safe and considerate, as we step into a new school year. Be mindful and patient as we work through these troubled times. Let's do what we can to get through this together.

#### IMPORTANT NOTICE TO UTILITY BILLING CUSTOMERS

On July 27th the City Council approved Ordinance A-252, an Ordinance adopting a Transportation Utility Fee (TUF) for all residential and business customers. The residential TUF will be \$7.00 per month. Businesses will be billed .27 per associated trip based upon the ITE code trips per day for business type times 1000 square of business space. The City staff will be contacting businesses to confirm your square footage and business type so you can be properly billed for this fee. 
