A Few Common Questions

I thought I'd use this opportunity to answer a few common questions I'm often asked.

"Why can't Coburg stay small?" "Why does Coburg have to *grow?*" Coburg can't stay the same because the world around us is constantly changing. For example, most of our city services are funded from the general fund, but administrative costs are rising, for a variety of legitimate reasons, faster than general revenues such as property taxes. Additionally, while most residents I've spoken with would appreciate more local businesses, to survive, businesses need more customers than Coburg currently provides. So this question is really a choice between two other questions: "How much can Coburg grow and still be small?" or "Which services do you want us to cut?" I welcome your comments.

"Given all that has happened in Coburg over that last decade or longer, why should I trust you now?" This is an incredibly important question. Trust is difficult to win and easy to lose. To be trustworthy as an elected official means to act with integrity, to be open and communicative, to be accountable, to be stewards of your money and time, to address as best we can the issues the City faces no matter how challenging, and to strive to make the most prudent and reasonable decisions possible for the benefit of the whole of Coburg.

Trust is also a two-way street. It is greatly appreciated by Council and city staff when residents seek to be informed, question inflammatory claims and rumors, and participate as best they can. Residents also need to recognize that Council faces many complex issues and decisions cannot always benefit

everyone. I know we won't always agree, but to be trustworthy is my pledge, and I ask that it be the pledge of everyone in Coburg.

"My [septic] tank was fine. Why do I have to pay the same as everyone else?" I fully understand the frustration some residents feel; my tank was also just fine. But it's also not really the point. One of the first steps of a waste treatment process is to separate the solids and liquids. In a typical sewer system, this separation process is centralized at a treatment site, typically in settling ponds. If the City had chosen this design, each of our septic tanks, both functioning and failing, would have been filled with sand and decommissioned.

But this isn't what the City chose to do. Rather, the City chose a Septic Tank Effluent Pump (STEP) system design which resurrected and repurposed the existing septic tanks as an integral part of the sewer system. This decision substantially reduced the projected system cost by several million dollars. My point is that the decision to either reuse or decommission the septic tanks was a system decision, not a per connection decision. Once the system decision was made, it then became important to reuse as many tanks as possible to keep the total system costs down.

"Why does the [Local Improvement District] assessment keep rising? Can't you guys just figure out what it's going to be?" From the outset, we've known that it was likely the LID would need to cover "what's left" after the other funding sources have been finalized. Costs and funding projections have changed relatively little; the roll-up of the uncertainties into one factor means the LID is likely to fluctuate more.

There are also a number of estimates we have to make which are material to setting the LID assessment. For example, one factor we have to consider is ensuring we have sufficient funds in ten to twenty years so that we aren't faced with stiff monthly rate increases. A critical projection is the future growth we assume. The most conservative stance is to assume no growth. But zero growth is also unrealistic and would cause us to set the LID assessment unnecessarily high.

At this writing, the Council is actively engaged in discussions on the LID assessment. For a variety of reasons, Council needs to set the LID assessment in September. Our goal is to ensure the fiscal soundness of the sewer project while minimizing the impact on residents and property owners. I want to thank the many of you who have written, taken the time to talk with me or with Councilors, or who have voiced your concerns and preferences at Council Meetings. I can attest that Councilors have been listening carefully and thoughtfully.


people from outside of Coburg to visit our beautiful little town. Our evaluation comments show that people love the show but also love our town.

Local Improvement District Assessment Coming in September

Please be prepared. A Local Improvement District assessment is coming within the September utility billing cycle. It is a method used by local governments to pay for a portion of the cost of developing a local improvement, such as a sewer or a street. The assessment is charged to properties in the district and the district is formed of all the properties that receive a benefit from the improvement. LID's can be used to help properties finance improvements to make their property safer, provide needed utilities, improve ascetics or make it more marketable for development.

Coburg's LID was adopted in 2011 and it is to be implemented at the end of the Wastewater Project. The Wastewater Project is complete, so after six months of discussion, City Council may act on setting the amount of the LID assessment at the September 9th City Council meeting. sorting 50+ years of accumulated life. The other day, at the suggestion of my wife, I took out my ukulele and we sang old songs together. For a few treasured moments, it felt like old times, and I cried on the drive back to Eugene.

A friend recently recommended that I check out the book When Two Worlds Meet. It is written by a Harvard trained minister who writes about caring for her aging mother with Alzheimer's disease. I'm hoping for some insights. Or perhaps just the knowledge that others have traveled this road before me.

In the meantime, here are a few things that I have learned. First, as a family, we didn't do much planning for this "season" of our parent's lives. As a result, we have had to scramble to pull together their

legal documents, and learn about everything from doctors and dentists, to finances, and pharmacies. All of this would have been much easier, if we had started talking when everyone's memory was "sharper." Second, family is everything. We three boys are all on the same page. We also have the

support of spouses to help share the frustrations, the phone calls, and the decisions. I can't imagine trying caring for aging parents, when the children themselves don't see eye to eye. Third, location matters. My

parents are blessed with wonderful neighbors who, more than once, have stepped in to help out with everything from meals and medicine, to yard work and rides. Fourth, it just comes down to love. In the final season of life, it becomes more important than ever to say, "I love you." We won't always agree on everything. But as long as we keep loving each other, we'll get through it.

If you are a "care giver" right now, give yourself a hug. If you are a neighbor, don't forget to check on the "old folks" next door. If you are a child or grandchild of aging parents, take the time to ask questions, tell stories, and share love. You'll be glad you did!
