The State Board of Education granted CCCS a waiver to the state law governing the charter school lottery for admission process. The waiver allows for students from within the former Coburg Elementary School's attendance boundary to be given priority over other 4j students for up to fifty percent of our total enrollment.

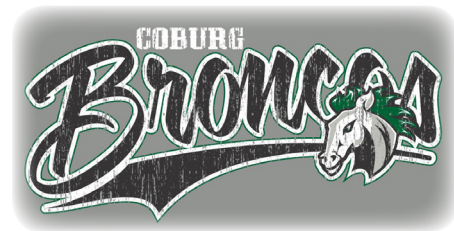

Our college daughter emailed me the other day to discuss a paper she is working on for her comparative religions class. Her professor asks them to identify one of the greatest challenges facing the modern world and then to reflect on how different religions address this challenge. It's a good question and one that got me thinking.

What are some of the big challenges facing our community, our state, our nation, or our world? Issues like global warming, hunger, or war come to mind quickly. But then there is unemployment, health care, drugs, and domestic violence. The list goes on and on. It is easier to list the challenges than it is to figure out how to address them. But frankly, this is the part that got me thinking. What if each one of took up just one challenge? And rather than just talking about it, we actually took small but deliberate steps to address the challenge.

Take hunger for example. Alone, we can't feed the world, or even all who are hungry in Lane County. But we can spend one to two dollars each week on food for the Food Pantry. We can't solve global warming, but we can cut out one driving errand each week and walk instead.

Getting involved doesn't have to be dramatic, but when hundreds, or thousands get involved, change happens. What is the difference you want to make this year?

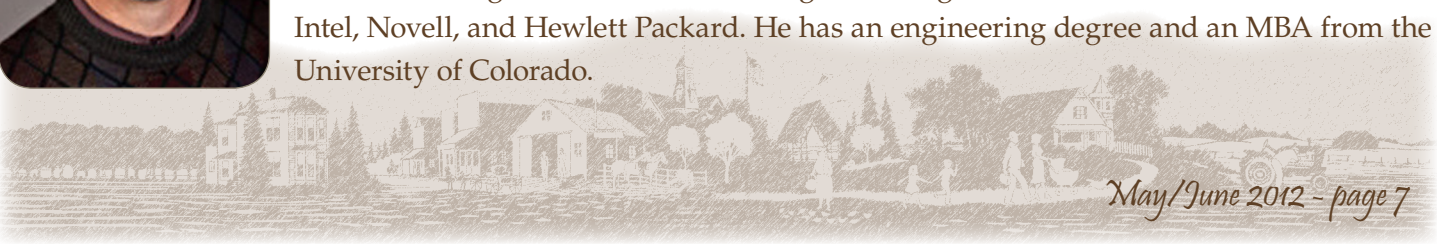
City Councilor Highlight
